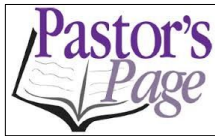

As I typed my report for the board, it occurred to me this might be one I should share with all of you. When I type a council report, you all have the opportunity to see it. When it is just for board, you may or may not see it. It is not that it is secret or anything, it is just that not a lot of people take time to look over the Church board reports with the exception of the board.

This is anniversary month for the Godfreys and NPCOB. We moved to the parsonage 19 years ago on August the 5th. We spent almost two weeks setting up shop in the parsonage and Church building. Then we began our journey together as I was installed as your pastor on August 16th. So please read on and see what I wrote to the board and I will finish with some other comments.

July 18th, Church Board Report

Well here we are, half way through our 100 year anniversary. We have thought about this for several years, been planning for more than a year and now are approaching our event days. This has been an interesting process to be a part of.

Sure, we have always had and probably always will have challenges finding enough helpers to do projects like this. However, we also had some pleasant surprises. Take for instance, the t-shirts. That was not on the radar at all. We got some things that had our 100 year logo on, but we never talked about t-shirts. Someone came to us and asked if it would that be okay to sell the shirts and give the profits to the Heifer Ark? We said, "If you want to do that, go for it"; and they did and sold a good many shirts.

Another example is the time capsule. We think there is one around here somewhere, perhaps in the building cornerstone. We stewed and stewed about how to find where that may be. We finally came to the conclusion that until we know where it is, we are not going exploring. While this was going on, someone said let's make a new one and leave good instructions of where it is so that 50 years or beyond (if the Lord tarries) people would know where it is to find and open it. After all, we must leave good instructions for there may not be many current committee members motivating around here at that point. So

permission was granted and a person is working to get this done.

It is interesting how things have worked their way into our 100 year celebration. An example of this is the pictorial directory. It has been a long while since we did one. There are many people that worship with us now that didn't then. There are also some in the directory who have gone to their eternal reward and or are not worshipping with us now. This seemed like a perfect time to update it. So on this anniversary; we will have a new directory with pictures of how we currently look

The stained glass windows were originally supposed to be installed in late 2016. However, that project took longer than expected, but guess what. They were installed in this anniversary calendar year. The windows have really added a nice touch to the sanctuary. Of course, I walk through the sanctuary more than most of you. I see a different sanctuary every trip through. Depending on the sun and the clouds, the sanctuary looks different on each trip. It is pretty amazing. Certainly beauty is something we like and we like the sanctuary to be beautiful, but the pictures tell of biblical accounts. And these accounts are much more important than the beauty of the glass. Now you probably have noticed that the two blocked off windows look kind of forlorn when compared to the stained glass ones. They, too, are going to be dressed up. I believe the plan is for Becky Drake to paint two more biblical accounts on them. I believe she is going to let John Miretti (the one who did the stained glass) sketch the scenes and she will paint them. We are talking about what the biblical accounts will be, but have not quite decided.

Now I want you to realize that even during these summer months, there is ministry going on. We had an excellent day of Bible School, our youth had an interesting and fulfilling work trip. They had some traveling problems; trailer tire problems. We are thankful no one was hurt except the trailer and the group is seeing that the trailer gets repaired.

I am writing this in the middle of our revival. We have already had two inspiring messages. We have been able to hear some wonderful music and singing. Pastor Bob went to the young married class for Sunday School class and was impressed with that group. As a matter of fact, he told me what I already knew. (but it is good to hear from someone else.) He said you really have a great group of folks at NPCOB. He said it is so encouraging to see a Church like this. Now Pastor Bob has mostly led Churches much larger than ours, so it was really nice to hear him say this. Many times our revival speakers say the same thing. My brother-in-law Charlie made similar comments last year.

Before we know it, fall will be here and the Church program will be back in high gear. But first we have the anniversary celebration coming this August 12. It promises to be a great evening. We are going to have a large tent erected. We will gather at 4:00 PM for fun and games. We will eat a meal at 5:00 PM. The main menu is pulled pork and cheesy potatoes and other sides. We are having an Amish man and his family come from Middlebury bringing a motorized ice cream freezer to make us homemade ice cream. When we are full from eating, we will go into the sanctuary. Our children's choir will sing a few numbers, and then the Godfrey Quartet will have a concert. This is the first time they have sung a concert for many years. Ben and some of Nancy and my family members are coming out to Indiana and we are really looking forward to this. It promises to be a great and full night. I pray that many people will come for these festivities. I will talk more about the December event as we get closer to that time.

So even though we have been pastor and congregation for nearly 19 years, sometimes it feels to me like we are still brand new. I don't feel our relationship has gotten old and stale. I still love being your pastor, I love you and working with you all. I love how many ideas you come up with, really great ideas; truthfully ideas I would not have thought of.

What does our future hold? How long is our future? I haven't a clue. Scripture tells us a truth. Isaiah is talking to the Israelites, but it is so true for all who will follow the Godhead. **Jeremiah 29:11** "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (NIV) So while we might not know the future, we know and serve the One who holds our future.

Who would have thought? A little over 22 years ago the Lord took a simple Dunker butcher and changed his life. He put a call on this butcher's life. And the Lord God called and challenged this butcher to prepare for this call. But the Lord God was not only working in PA, He was working with a Church in Indiana. He challenged them to take a chance on this butcher and we are in the midst of trusting Him to see where and how this will finish for the Lord's Glory. To God be the Glory, Great things He has done. In Christ's love, Pastor Stan.

Now I am still amazed as to how fast this time has gone. 22 years is a long time. I feel it seems like 10 or less years. Yet at the same time, it seems longer. It is kind of like Nancy and my marriage. We got married in October of 1975. We welcomed Joe into the family in January of 1978. So it was only Nancy and I for a little over 2 years. And try as we might, it is difficult to remember what our life was like before children. As the Lord gave us the rest of our sons, I remember thinking; I can't wait until they are out of diapers and can get around by themselves. At that particular time it seemed we would never be done changing diapers. Sometimes I would like to take that thought back. Now we have only two grandchildren in diapers and five that are not; and they are growing like weeds. Our sons are at the age where I started to feel I couldn't do some of the things I could earlier in life. Nancy and my grandparents have all died, she has lost her dad. I have lost my dad too, except he is technically living. But the dad my sisters and I knew and loved is not around. Life is so strange, so bewildering at times.

Well those thoughts kind of wandered in, I wasn't planning on going that way. The thing is, that on August 16th, we begin our 20th year in ministry together. The Lord has done some amazing things, for that I give him the honor and glory. And I have messed some things up, I humbly ask your forgiveness and am thankful for your continued love.

I commit to you my continued service as the Lord God sees fit to use me and gives me His strength to continue it. Together we will plod forward, understanding that sometimes we may slide backwards. Do I still have enough biblical material to share with you? Oh my yes, we only have scratched the surface. However as the Lord matures us, I believe He has us looking at the meat of the Bible that He wants us to study and understand. In some ways, I wish that I knew in 1998 what I know now. But that is not what the Lord wanted. He had to mature me in many ways to have me at the point of life He has me.

So here we go, facing life together,
one day at a time.

December 4, 1931. a young lady in the membership of the New Paris Church of the Brethren was planning her wedding. She also requested that piano music be allowed.

After some lively debate, the Church Council voted" ... to allow a piano to be placed in the church for a special meeting in the near future." Approximately three weeks later, the Church hosted the "special meeting" / wedding of Sister Pauline Bollinger Bauer.

(A piano was permanently installed in the church 8 years later, in 1939. An electric organ followed in 1952)

Facts About The Bible

The Bible is composed of 66 books. There are 39 books in the Old Testament and 27 in the New Testament. Some 39 or 40 men had a part in the writing of the Bible, from Moses to the apostle John. It took over 1500 years to produce the Bible.

Out of all the men who wrote the books of the Bible, Luke "the beloved physician" (Col. 4:14) was the only Gentile. He penned the gospel of Luke and the book of Acts.

The first section of the Old Testament is called the Pentateuch. It contains the first five books of the Bible (Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy). These books, written by Moses, cover the period of time from Creation to the death of Moses, just prior to the entrance of God's people into the promised land.

The Old Testament contains twelve books of history, from Joshua through Esther. There are five books of poetry: Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and the Song of Solomon. There are five books of the major prophets: Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations, Ezekiel and Daniel. There are 12 minor prophets, from Hosea through Malachi.

The New Testament contains four gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John), each telling the story of the life of Christ from different viewpoints. The New Testament has one book of history, the book of Acts, which tells of the establishment of the church and the growth of Christianity in the first century. It also has 21 epistles, the majority of which were written by the apostle Paul (Romans through Jude) and one book of prophecy (the Revelation), penned by John while on the isle of Patmos.

The Old Testament was written in Hebrew (with the exception of Daniel 2:4b-7:28 and Ezra 4:8-6:18). The New Testament was written in Greek.

The Catholic Bible

The Catholic Bible (including the Douay version, the Confraternity Version and the New American Bible) contains seven extra books: Tobias, Judith, Wisdom, Ecclesiasticus, Baruch, First and Second Maccabees, plus additional parts in the books of Esther and Daniel. Neither Jesus nor the apostles ever quoted from these books as if they were inspired.

The Apocryphal books were rejected by the first century Jewish Flavius Josephus and were never accepted by the Palestinian Jews.

When Jerome (now a Roman Catholic "saint") translated the Hebrew Old Testament into Latin, he rejected these books as non-canonical (383-406 a.d.).

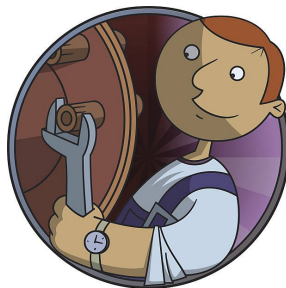
The Apocryphal books were not even received by the Roman Catholic Church until the Council of Trent on April 8, 1546.

A turn of the screw
