Today is a different day for me. I am going with the ladies to Timbercrest for the May Birthday Party. This is the first time I am able

to go along and help. It is also a second day back in the office because Gina is ill. Hopefully she will have a speedy

recovery and be back here in no time.

Stan mentioned in his last article that I might write about our marriage experience, but he doubted it. I asked him why he said that I wouldn't do it and I quickly corrected him saying that he never asked me. HA! He asked me to write about it this month.

We started dating after he showed up at my church on Sunday evenings. What prompted him to show up was having seen me and my younger sister at a District Youth Event. We played some games and one of them was to pass a live saver candy from one to another on a toothpick. Well, I lost my life saver at an unmentionable spot and was shocked. Not knowing what to do, I motioned to my sister to come with me to the bathroom. We retrieved the life saver and had a good laugh.

After that, Stan started showing up at Sunday PM services. He asked me out for ice cream and he asked me for a date the next week. I already had plans so he was a bit disappointed. But I mentioned that the next Sunday was our Sunday School picnic and invited him to come to that. Thus began our courtship. We would not see each other all week but called on the phone on Wednesday nights. Stan would come over Friday nights after work. Then we usually had plans together for the weekend. We often sat in the car in the driveway or on the back porch after a date and just talked.

One Monday night we went to the PA Farm Show at Harrisburg in Stan's Dodge Charger. The Farm Show is always in January. It was snowing and Stan had to keep pulling off the road and clean the snow off the headlights. We had a good time there and bought some yellow rose buds. On the way home we were going up a hill toward my home when we started to slip and slide and ended up in a field. We were stuck! Stan had to call his Uncle Mahlon to bring a tractor to pull us out. While waiting for his uncle, my older sister, driving a little orange Volkswagen came by. She stopped on that hill,

got out of the car, and asked if we needed help. We said help was on the way. So she got back into that VW and chugged right on up that hill! - much to Stan's chagrin! The roses we bought were in the back seat of the car all that time. I thought that might be the end of them. But, they bloomed beautiful and long. That is one reason why yellow roses are one of my favorites.

We were both anxious to marry. I was looking for a good 'Church of the Brethren' boy. He was at the point in his life when he felt he was ready to marry. He had his car, savings, a good job. We talked about marriage pretty early in our dating. He asked me to marry him soon after that Farm Show date and by February 14, I was wearing a diamond. I was still in Business School studying to be a Medical Secretary. I soon dropped the Medical and graduated with an Associates Degree in Secretarial that June.

By October, we were married. That is when things changed. On our honeymoon, we toured the New England states. The roads and highways in there are not easy to navigate. I was supposed to be the navigator and we missed a turn off. That meant we had to go many extra miles to find the next turn off and get back to the right one. That was when I first heard language like I never heard before and raging anger. I was totally shocked and shaken. It was like someone slapped me in the face. I had never heard such words or seen such anger.

In the spring before we were married, we had bought a house and I was putting my things in the house over the summer. The basement was not finished. I put many things down there ready to move in when we marry. That house was a high ranch style. You would go in the front door and go either up to the main floor or down to the unfinished basement, laundry and garage. It was a good feeling to come home to 'our' house after our honeymoon. But it was built on a 1/3 acre plot and we had 25 trees on that small lot. We came home to lots of leaves.

We started housekeeping, but things were a bit rough. I think Stan thought he could make me do what his mom and sisters <u>all</u> did for him together. That was too much for one to do what four did. I think I had the dream of Prince Charming sweeping me off my feet. Neither of our plans were working.

I remember one evening Stan had me sitting on a step-stool in the kitchen and he was standing before me berating me like I was a little child. This was still in our first year of marriage. I was wondering what in the world have I gotten myself into! Divorce was a scary word and not what I wanted. But I was scared and unhappy. How could this be? He was turning out to be a very different man than who I thought I married.

There were some good times. Each baby born was a special time. As the children grew, though, the rough times would still come. We were somewhat together on disciplining. But many times when I thought Stan could do a better job than me, he would overdo it. Joe, being the oldest, would want to walk ahead of us instead of with the family. Stan ridiculed him for thinking he was better than us. I was mainly concerned about Joe getting too far ahead of us. Ben was an excitable child. He would get a bit hyper. One time when scolding him, (I think he was barely two) Stan threw him into a upholstered chair and Ben fell asleep the way he landed. Dan always learned things differently than the others. Studying was a bit harder for him. He was a very shy baby and preschooler. We were into the "Back to the Future" movies at that time. In that movie there was a nerdy type guy who got teased by the bully. The bully would knock on the nerd's head;

saying "Hey,'McFly' is there anybody in there?" Stan would do that to Dan and I know that did not help Dan with his confidence.

Sam came along and had the same determination as his dad. Sam was not afraid to try anything. One night he was determined not to eat his supper. Stan got angry with him and slapped him. Sam had a very red face, but I don't think he cried. I think the tears were there but he was determined not to cry.

I didn't get much help from Stan in about the first 15 years of marriage. I stuck it out but there were many times when I wanted to scream and shout for me or the boys. Many times Stan would come home angry and we had to walk on egg shells because we didn't want to anger the bull.

Once when at our first house I was sick and could not get up without messing my clothes. It was a Friday night and Stan still expected me to get up and make supper. I simply could not. Once at our farm house I was making finger Jell-O and when I went to put it in the fridge to set, I dropped it on the floor. What a mess! I was in my nightgown and Stan came through and laughed at me and the mess. He then continued on to bed, never stopping to help me. That one made me mad and I slammed the stair door after making some comment. He and the boys were all upstairs and Stan made some comment to them which had the boys laughing, too. That was even worse.

When my mother told me that my father and another District person were wanting to see him to see if he would consider ministry, I told her he would say 'no'. At this time, Stan was going through some hard times at the butcher shop and doing some counseling that turned into marriage counseling. When my father and the District man finally got with Stan, his answer, to my surprise, was 'yes'! Stan started classes for ministry and the wife could go along. I didn't have to take the tests, but it helped in preparing you for the job of minister's wife. Between the counseling, ministry classes, and changes at the Butcher Shop, Stan started to change, too.

It was not an overnight thing. It took time and he is still changing. He is a different man today than the man I married. Life is much better for us. The man you see today, is the man God has led him to be. The best thing is despite what happened in the early years of their lives, the boys have become great husbands and fathers. The boys grew up seeing this change in their father and know which is best.

Me, I have prayed since marriage and that night on the stool that things would change because I didn't know what else to do. I'm a private prayer person. I seldom do public prayer, but oh, do I believe in it. I remember leaving our bedroom at the farm one night (a bad night emotionally) and going downstairs to a couch and praying to God. I didn't know what to say, so I just cried and moaned and cried. I knew something had to give. Praise God it did and He did it. God gave our whole family a new life. It was hard to leave PA and after we got here, I still wondered, "What are we doing here?" But God had plans for us and I can not see us ever going back to PA. This is where He wants us to be. We have adjusted to living without brothers, sisters & parents. Although the time now is rough with Stan's parents, we know this is where God wants us to be.

NPCOB Did you know . . . ?

April 1, 1919. "Request denied!" At the January 2, 1919 quarterly Council meeting, the New Paris Church of the Brethren determined a Church historian was necessary. A teenage member, Brother Eldon Evans, was elected, with the Rev. Henry Warstler selected as his assistant. At the next meeting, in April 1919, Brother Evans submitted his resignation, but was denied his request. (The Council did eventually let him off the hook, accepting his second request re resignation, at the next meeting on June 27, 1919. Brother Evans went on to later become Elder Evans, providing his leadership into the late 1950's.)

June 27, 1919. "Behind every good man..." John Arnold, Ed Boyts and Henry Neff were established as a committee in April 1919 to make preparations for a September 1919 communion. Their responsibilities included obtaining materials for, and building, the tables, buying table service, and getting other related things in order. "The committee reported back to Council..."On June 27, 1919. "It seems that they had been unable to cope with all the tough decisions they faced so Council added the wives to the committee!"

To be fair, it does seem this was a big production. For instance: When it was time for Love Feast, the men carried table parts from the basement to the outdoors then "...passed them into the sanctuary through the windows. Then they re-assembled the tables and set them in place."

September 1919. The first of the "Annual Visits." Each September, and prior to Love Feast and Communion, visits were made to each church member's home. Generally, two-man teams would visit approximately 15 homes. The visits were multi-purpose, but most notably at these visits 1) Inquiries were made of members as to whether they are "at peace" with other Brethren (and instructing them to reconcile soon/quickly), and 2) Ensuring members' lives conformed to congregational disciplines and Brethren doctrine.

"The Visit" was a well-established part of congregational life across many Districts of the Brotherhood...", i.e. the larger Brethren Church... Those visits were impressive reminders of what the Church expected from its members. As long as all members conformed on doctrine and life style, fewer unsettling concerns, doubts and conflicts arose."

The New Paris Church of the Brethren continued these Visits annually through 1928. In 1929, though with some dissent, the Council voted to discontinue the Annual Visit.

Don't Mark Your Mistakes

On New Year's Day, 1929, Georgia Tech played UCLA in the Rose Bowl. In that game a young man named Roy Riegels recovered a fumble for UCLA. Picking up the


loose ball, he lost his sense of direction and ran sixty-five yards toward the wrong goal line. One of his teammates ran him down and tackled him just before he scored for the opposing team.

The strange play came in the first half. At half-time the UCLA players filed off the field and into the dressing room. As others sat down on the benches and the floor, Riegels put a blanket around his shoulders, sat down in a corner, and put his face in his hands.

A football coach usually has a great deal to say to his team during half-time. That day Coach Price was quiet. When the timekeeper came in and announced that there were three minutes before playing time, Coach Price looked at the team and said, "Men, the same team that played the first half will start the second." The players got up and started out, all but Riegels. He didn't budge. The coach looked back and called to him. Riegels didn't move. Coach Price went over to where Riegels sat and said, "Roy, didn't you hear me? The same team that played the first half will start the second."

Roy Riegels looked up, his cheeks wet with tears. "Coach," he said, "I can't do it. I've ruined you. I've ruined the university's reputation. I've ruined myself. I can't face that crowd out there." Coach Price reached out, put his hand on Riegels's shoulder, and said, "Roy, get up and go on back. The game is only half over."

Riegels finally did get up. He went onto the field, and the fans saw him play hard and play well. All of us have run a long way in the wrong direction at times. But remember, because of God's mercy, the game is only half over.
